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Paris: land donation first step to new fire station

Lucky Fire Station No. 13 just got a \$125,000 head

Thanks to an agreement between the county and Scott Rye of Lakewood Land Company, the county has some free land upon which to put Fire Station 13.

The station is still in the planning stages, however, and Union County Fire Chief David Dyer has estimated the station as being roughly two years out from completion.

There are currently 12 fire stations located around Union County, and Station 13 will serve the north end of the county, which was identified as an area of need last year in the fire department's five-year

U.S. 129-N, just inside the

Harbor lakefront development that will hold its Grand Opening this weekend.

Rye - whose Lakewood Land Company is responsible for a total of six developments around the county, including Thirteen Hundred on Lake Nottely and Northshore contacted Union County Sole Commissioner Lamar Paris about getting some assistance on the turn lane for Hidden Harbor.

Commissioner Paris was able to talk with the Georgia Department of Transportation to reduce the length of the turn lane from the maximum initially required, which in turn saved Rye money in construction costs

Prior to Rye approaching Commissioner Paris about the turn lane, the commissioner and Chief Dyer knew they wanted to place Station No. 13 somewhere near where Hidden Harbor ended up be-

ing, in the Ivy Log Creek area, and when Rye caught wind of the idea, he decided to donate the 1.7 acres to the county.

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"We were told that this area of the county could use the fire protection," said Rye, whose construction crews in Blairsville are mostly from Blairsville. "And with all the business we've done here in the county, we just felt like it was a good thing to do for the county, the people around here, our customers coming in, having a fire department right here.

"We've had a lot of help from the county, and it's kind of our way, also, to say thanks. This is our sixth year developing in the county.
