

Union County athletics shine brightest during 2014-15 school year

Union County High School's 2014-15 school year is a wrap but its athletes sure put on a show.

The Panthers brought home two Region 8-AA titles in the fall as both Cross Country squads dominated the Region meet at Riverside Military Academy.

Senior Julia Lindsey, who split time as the Drum Major for UCHS' Pride of the Mountains Marching Band set the pace and picked up an individual Region title for the Lady Panthers.

Right behind Lindsey was another Lady Panther. Twotime defending Region and State Champion, junior Emma Garrison placed second - giving Union a 1-2 finish.

For the guys, freshman Lance Underwood just missed a first place finish, but still managed a strong second. Junior Cristian Garcia came in fourth and Jacob Kelley, also a junior, was sixth.

Union County football and Lady Panthers' softball were denied a Region Championship thanks to Rabun County and Social Circle.

However, the Lady Panthers found some success in the State Tournament after three straight first round exits.

Before reaching State, Union knocked off Rabun to advance to the Region Championship where Social Circle proved too much.

After taking down Darlington in Round One at home, Union went on the road to face another private school, the Wesleyan Lady Wolves

The Lady Panthers took Game One by a 4-2 score thanks to a 3-for-3 performance from senior Crystal Busbee.


Sophomore ace Laken Chambers fired a three-hitter and Union was in the driver's seat going into Game Two.

Wesleyan would pull away from the Lady Panthers thanks to a pair of defensive miscues in the seventh inning that allowed them to take a 5-1 Game Two victory.

Two spectacular, running grabs by the Wesleyan outfield in Game Three allowed the Lady Wolves to hold on to a 5-3 win and advance to Columbus for the State Elite 8.

The Tigers came to Blairsville with the winner taking the No. 2 seed and home field advantage in the first round of State.

The Panthers would prevail in a see-saw battle by a score of 35-34 after Wilkes fumbled on the Union County 11-yard line with 1:03 to play.

Despite falling 50-36 to Model in Round One, the Panthers reached State in consecutive years markable 29-8 record that was for the first time in team history of the Year. She led the Lady

Junior quarterback Joseph vided quite a treat to Panther fans Mancuso picked up First Team All-State honors with 3,078 yards passing, 34 touchdowns and 2 picks. On the ground he ran for 422 yards and three scores.

Lady Panthers basketball Union responded with a continued its winning ways with their seventh trip to State in the last 8 years.

After splitting the regular season with Rabun, the two teams met in the Region Championship where the Lady Cats connected on a desperation heave from just inside mid-court to snatch the trophy away from the Lady Panthers.

In the opening round of State, Darlington defeated Union 69-64 despite 10 treys from the Lady Panthers, who finished 19-7 overall and 10-1 in Region play.

Senior guard Brooke Maddox was named the Region Player

the second highest win-total in and tied a team-record with nine Panthers in assists, steals, and was second in scoring, while joining Lauren Zollinger as Union's second 8-AA POY in the last three years.

> The Union County men reached State in back-to-back seasons for the first time since they made it four straight from 2000-2003.

> With a 17-12 record, the Panthers finished third in 8-AA.

> The highlight of the season came in early January when Union dismantled eventual 8-AA Champ Greene County 75-54 with senior Hunter Hughes pouring in a career-high 35 points.

> At State, however, the Panthers fell 68-62 at Coosa despite opening up a 14-2 advantage right out of the gates.

Despite losing its No. 2 pitcher early in the season, Union County baseball won its first Region title since 1990 - finishing 16-6 on the year with a handful

games canceled due to weather. The Panthers split with the

Region crown with Rabun, who was awarded the No. 1 seed due to owning a tiebreaker over Union.

The Wildcats and Panthers also split their two meetings during the season and Union hosted Model in the opening round of State and came-from-behind to take Game One before holding on in Game Three.

In Round Two, Union won Game One at Fitzgerald but dropped the next two contests. The Panthers finished with two Sweet 16 appearances in three years.

The Lady Panthers soccer team allowed just one goal during the regular season as they dismantled the competition in 8-AA on their way to their first Region title in 11 years and their first Elite 8 appearance in team history.

Also shorthanded with leading scorer Maddy Morlock injured, Union won its first two 3200M race.

The Lady Panthers finished the season ranked No. 5 in the State and were the highest ranked public school in Class AA.

Jonathan Davenport extends winning streak to eight with Fayetteville victory

Davenport, Blairsville, GA native, now living in Williamston, SC, pocketed \$10,000 for the 50lap victory – his fourth consecutive Lucas Oil Late Model Dirt Series triumph and eighth overall since May 18. Pearson finished second – the same position he occupies behind Davenport in the Lucas standings - followed by Kentucky's Steve Francis, Indiana's Steve Casebolt and another South Carolinian, Ross Bailes.

Davenport's moment of opportunity came on a lap-28 restart. Francis chose the bottom behind Pearson in the "Delaware

that left Davenport alone on the outside for the green flag. And as they charged down into the first turn, Davenport shot around Pearson on the outside and sailed away to an easy victory.

"I got to third at a perfect time," Davenport said. "Steve gave me the outside and I said, 'I'm already this far, I'm going to blow it off in here and see what happens.'

The bold move caught Pearson off guard, and he was kicking himself afterward.

"He just got me on the start there, that's all there is to it," the four-time Lucas series titlist said. "I was just trying to protect the bottom and he just drove around me on the outside."

The Fayetteville race was the first for the Lucas series since 2009, and it unfolded a bit oddly for numerous reasons.
