Together, the Union County 4-H Shotgun team members captured the runner up, or Second Place trophy, in the 2014 Georgia 4-H State Shotgun Match.

The Panthers finished second to the Laniers in the Modified Trap Shoot held in May.

Steppe: 'Milestones tests will challenge students'

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Union County Schools Superintendent Gary Steppe believes Georgia Milestones is a step in the right direction for school systems in the state of Georgia.

The new system for assessing the progress of Georgia students grades 3-12 takes students in a different direction from CRCT and EOCT testing, Steppe said.

Criterion-Referenced Competency Tests and End Of Course Testing became guessing games with the multiple-choice questions on each.

No longer will Georgia students be playing "Trivial Pursuit," Steppe said.

For example, Steppe believes students will go beyond just knowing that Christopher Columbus discovered America in 1492. He believes they will ask, "Why did Columbus discover America?"

"It's not a bad thing that

a test drives a curriculum as long as what we're teaching and how we're teaching it is good for kids," Steppe said. "If we can get them to think more critically because of the testing, it's a good thing."

The new tests also will measure student growth, Steppe said.

"Student growth will be compared differently than

Ralston names Allison to study committee for wrongfully accused

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Georgia House Speaker David Ralston (R-Blue Ridge) has appointed House District 8 State Rep. Stephen Allison (R-Blairsville), to the House Study Committee on Compensating Wrongfully Convicted Persons.

The committee, established by House Resolution 1332 also includes State Rep. Carolyn Hugley (D-Columbus), who will serve as Committee Chair, State Rep. Ben Harbin (R-Evans), State Rep. Rahn Mayo (D-Decatur), and State Rep. B.J. Pak (R-Lilburn).

The committee's task is to determine a uniform method for fairly and reasonably compensating wrongfully convicted persons.

The committee will recommend any actions or legislation that it deems necessary

The committee will study procedures used in other jurisdictions in the United States in an effort to ensure that any person wrongfully convicted in Georgia is compensated fully and fairly.

The committee will publish a report of its findings and recommendations, which may include suggestions for proposed legislation.

The report will be made on or before Dec. 1.
