

A. I have to answer that by reminding everyone of the three pennies of






that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable rights. that among these are life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness.

grandfather to Trapptown Store to get a cold Nehi. There were a bunch of old timers in the store that day and I listened to their tales as I enjoyed the Nehi grape and peanuts. The conversation turned to snakes and

Immediately, the handle swelled up big as a log and I run it through a mill and had enough lumber to make big kitchen table out of it. sales tax we currently have in Union County. Four pennies of every dollar you spend in Union County


goes to the State of Georgia, while the other three pennies goes to SPLOST, ESPLOST, and LOST. The SPLOST (Special Purpose Local Option Sales Tax) penny goes to county government sales tax for capital expenditures (buildings, equipment, roads and property). The more sales tax money that comes in to our county the more improvements we can make in Union County. The ESPLOST (Education SPLOST) penny goes to the school system for buildings, equipment and property. The LOST (Local Option Sales Tax) penny goes for operation of county government and comes directly off your property taxes!!! So higher sales tax collections means continued property tax relief.

So the new schools, the roads and bridges and other county buildings and projects are paid for with two pennies. However, the third penny saves us approximately 30% to 40% on our property tax bill. So shopping at home helps EVERYONE in this county.

Q.I already spend money locally. Why do we need this program?

A. While we all spend money in our local economy, the goal of this program is to encourage each citizen to identify items they are not currently buying locally when that product or service is available here. For example, consider where you are buying your groceries and your gas. Each time you stop outside of the County to fill your gas tank or pick up a few groceries, that is lost revenue to our businesses and our tax base. For instance, if you fill up in Jasper or any other out of county station for \$100.00 (the cost to fill up many trucks and SUV's), that is \$3 lost to another county. It is estimated that we could easily be losing \$50,000 a year in gasoline sales taxes alone. That could pay for a new playground at Meeks Park, not to mention saving all of us on property taxes. I often hear people say they like to shop at Lowe's because they get better service and a different product line. While I am not against

Lowe's, we have four hardware stores in Union County for your shopping pleasure. What I am saying is that every penny we can bring to Union County is SOOO important. It is important to our sales tax income, but it is more important to our merchants whose livelihoods are being threatened by the slow economy. This impacts every facet of this County and our



portance of this program. This week I want to address the benefits of shopping locally as well as the exciting components of our brand new BEST program.

It is important to pause for a moment and think about the positive community impact you could be making each time you pull out your wallet. Shopping locally supports the stability and growth of our local businesses that depend on each of us to thrive. Businesses use about 50 cents of every dollar for employee salaries and benefits. Much of the rest is reinvested in inventory, expansion and operating costs. Part of every dollar spent locally helps to improve our schools, roads and emergency and other government services. By making purchases locally, you are supporting the sustainabil-ity and creation of jobs for your family, your neighbors, and yourself. Local businesses also invest more in our community. Have you ever asked for a sponsorship from a small business? If not, you are one of few! Local businesses give back a significant portion of their proceeds to support a variety of local sports teams, charities, and events which add greatly to our quality of life. In addition to the financial reasons, there are also customer service reasons to shop locally. For example, when you shop locally, you get to know the business owner and they get to know you. Are you ready to make the change? If we can start to spend our dollars with a goal of only \$100 additional per year for each household spent locally, by this time next year those \$100 purchases would be over half a million dollars we have invested in our local community! Here are a few good places to start: When purchasing gifts or clothing, forget the mall. Union County has outstanding retail stores that offer unique items. When your gas tank is nearing empty, be sure to fill up within the county. When searching for printing, marketing, or other such services – don't you dare go online!
