## Sheriff: 'no money in budget for a boat to patrol Lake Nottely'

Union County Sheriff Mack Mason told members of the Lake Nottely Improvement Association that he has no control of the budget that he inherited, and that no money, or no program was in place for the Union County Sheriff's Office for a boat to use for law enforcement on Lake Nottely.

Sheriff Mason, along with Union County Sole Commissioner Lamar Paris, Georgia Department of Natural Resources Ranger Kevin Dyer, and U. S. Forest Service Wildlife Biologist Jim Wentworth met with the association's membership last week at the Union Community Center.

Sheriff Mason took center stage to touch on a few findings that were discovered once he took office in January.

'There was a boat purchased with drug seizure money, but the motor was allowed to freeze and burst and then repaired," Sheriff Mason said. "We did an assessment and determined that it wasn't feasible for what we needed

## **Enotah Judical Circuit budget OK'd**

Commissioners representing the four counties that make up the Enotah Judicial Circuit met at the Union County Community Center on June 26th to approve the final draft budget for Fiscal Year 2014. The pre-budget meet-

ing between the five-member boards of White and Lumpkin counties, Towns County Sole Commissioner Bill Kendall and Union County Sole Commissioner Lamar Paris had already taken place earlier in the year and the representatives gathered to cast their final vote on the FY2014 budget. The final budget

is \$698,415, with White contributing \$181,701.98.

Clay County, NC Sheriff Vic Davis reports that John Douglas Graham, 48, of Blairsville, was recaptured late Monday night, on Qualla Road, about a mile from the county jail.

Graham escaped from the Clay County Jail on Sun-
