he brought a good book to keep him company during the donation.

"Any time you can give blood, you're liable to save somebody else's life," said Kennard. "If your blood can save somebody else's life, and you can give blood and not worry about it, do it."

Mark Dehler of Young Harris is a longtime blood donor, and while he usually gives blood in Towns County, he drove over for the Blairsville Blood Drive because he sees giving blood as performing a public service.

"I think people ought to try it and see how they feel afterward," said Dehler. "I'm just one of those, I'd rather try, and if you like it you can do it again. We all depend on it, and God knows when we'll all need it."

Larry "Duff" Conley, director of the Union County Recreation Department, said that he too gives blood while keeping in mind those in need, though there are other reasons to give blood.

"I get my blood pressure checked for free, for one thing," said Conley, who has given blood for 30 years. "But it's to benefit others. I have thick blood, anyhow, so I figure it helps my condition as well."

And for those who are hesitant about getting stuck with a needle, Conley said that "it's not bad at all."

"And it doesn't take that long on a day like today, you're in and out in 30, 45 minutes," said Conley. "It's not much of a sacrifice."

Donors with smartphones should consider downloading the American Red Cross Blood Donor app, which allows donors to schedule their donation and keep track of what they've given and their blood type.

Furthermore, donors can take part in the Red Cross RapidPass Online Health History System, which takes approximately 10 to 15 minutes to complete but allows donors to fill out certain information at home rather than at the donation site.

"The technology allows blood and platelet donors to read the required pre-donation information and answer health history questions from the convenience of their own computer prior to arriving at a blood drive," according to the American Red Cross website. "RapidPass streamlines the donation experience and can reduce the time donors spend at Red Cross blood drives by up to 15 minutes."

Union County's grant was a Pre-Disaster Mitigation (PDM) grant totaling \$24,000. In a PDM grant, the federal government will reimburse the county 75 percent of the grant and the county pays the other 25 percent (\$18,000 federal share and \$6,000 local share). Union County's share was paid by a labor match.
