A. That is very hard to quantify. At the height of the home and real estate market boom in 2006, our growth rate was in the 3% -4% range per year, which was definitely too much. Home permits were in the range of 40 to 60 homes per month. However, during 2009 - 2013 recession, permits were in the range of 1 to 8 homes per month. We estimate we are probably in the .5% to 1% range growth rate now and that is increasing slightly. So long as we stay in 2% range or under, we think it is sustainable. Currently new home construction is in the 8 to 18 permits per month.

**Q. Can you really do anything to stop growth?**

A. Not really. God has blessed us with one of the most beautiful areas and climates and it has attracted many already to move here and more to simply stay. I often hear people say they wish we had a certain brand grocery store or different restaurants. But every time we have a new one come here, most seem to love it, but then complain about the traffic and crowds, including me sometimes. However, you can not have it both ways. It is either like it used to be with dirt and mud roads everywhere, little pavement, poor and run down facilities and people that all had to leave here to look for jobs. Or have the wonderful county that we now are blessed with. Sure we may have too much traffic at times, or too long a wait to eat sometimes, but our people are financially coming back with good and profitable businesses and restaurants, great county facilities, wonderful people and ---- more people.

**Q. What happens when a community stops growing?**

A. I think if you ask some of the people of Hiawassee, you would find that businesses leave town or close, property sales are very slow and it is kind of depressing. I personally feel a duty to try

to continue to seek good employment for our young people getting out of high school or college. It is easy to be retired, enjoying life and wanting things to basically stay the same as they are now. I certainly understand that thought process. But the vast majority of us have kids, grand kids or great grand kids and don't we want them to have a part of the American Dream no matter where they live? Is it really fair to just not worry about them and instead only worry about ourselves?

**Q. Is Union County and the City of Blairsville lucky to have what we have?**

A. I think we are very lucky. We have exceptional county and city facilities for people of all ages, giving us an unmatched quality of life. We have many public safety employees and volunteers that are there to help any of us at a second's notice. We have one of the best rural hospitals anywhere. We have many churches covering most religions whose members are always wanting to help others. We have hundreds of community volunteers and service club members who work tirelessly to help make this a better community. We have the best schools and school facilities of most counties in Georgia, we have nearly 200 full time and part time county employees that tend to your every local government need and work hard to be sure you maintain the best quality of life anywhere. In Meeks Park, we have one of the most outstanding recreation facilities anywhere. We have the most caring and helpful people living here, that are from here or have moved here, full or part time, and make this their home. feeding for another four to six weeks, the grubs go through a transition stage (pupa) and become adults which emerge in June to begin the cycle again.

The Japanese beetle is particularly devastating to landscapes because both the grubs and the adults feed excessively on plants. However, there are a few control methods that can be taken to decrease beetle populations around your home. If you have several bare spots in your turf that you suspect may be from beetle larvae feeding on grass roots, peel back a single square foot section of turf and count the number of grubs present. If you have more than five grubs in a square foot, you should treat your lawn with appropriate insecticides to prevent the larvae

from doing any more damage. If adult beetles are infesting only a small area of your property, physical removal may be most economical and effective. However, in cases where a large percentage of property is affected, chemical control with insecticides may be required. Planting ornamentals that are unappealing to Japanese beetles can also help prevent large populations from establishing. However, never place beetle traps because they can actually end up attracting even more beetles to your property!

Jack's Gap Trail. After a ways we turned west off the trail and began walking alongside the mountain. We soon found ourselves in an Ivy thicket. We crawled on our hands and knees a ways. It felt like miles, however, I think it was only 1/2 mile. We soon popped into the edge of a clearing and found the largest Birch Tree I have ever seen. One that I have never been able to find again.

Soon we made our way back to the trail and traveled until we found a lead going off the mountain. We followed the Rocky Lead off the mountain. Our group found some really large trees and some of the steepest ground I have ever walked upon. An old clear cut soon forced us down off the ridge top and we sat down underneath a tree at an old sawmill site. I leaned against the tree and felt a prick in my hip. I sat up and realized I was sitting on a Chestnut Burr. The old burr was from a hybrid chestnut set out in the 1980s. We were able to see some beautiful sites, but, did not find the Rock House with the soap stone furniture.

Another time Tom Starrett, Harold Dyer and I made the same trip, but, we walked off of another lead. Once again

we traveled through Ivy and Laurel thickets. We found some really nice ledges of stone. But, couldn't find anything resembling a Rock House. We have made 2-3 other trips off the Rocky Lead looking for this place and have yet to find it. So, we keep looking. Who knows, we may find it yet.

On one such trip Harold and I became separated from Tom in yet another thicket. We came to a slick wildlife trail going almost straight up and followed it into an unknown Rock House. The vegetation was so thick you couldn't see more than 10-15 feet and all at once we found ourselves under this rock overhang. We looked down and noticed fresh bear scat all around our feet. Harold looked at me and said, "I once knew a lady hiker that asked me what should we do if we seen a bear. I looked at the lady and asked if she could run fast. She told me no. So, I looked at her and replied, "I can run faster than you, so, I do not have anything to worry about". So, Harold asked me, "How fast are you Mickey?" I said, "Fast enough." He just grinned and so we keep looking for our Rock House.
