

Softball: Union concludes Summer League play; come together as a family

Scrimmage vs White on Aug. 7th; season opens Aug. 9th at Lanier Point Tourney

Dahlonega - The Union County Lady Panthers wrapped up Summer League action with one win, two losses, and a tie.

Union County traveled to Dahlonega for the North Georgia Summer Classic and got off to a good start on Monday, knocking off the defending 8-AAA Region Champions Jackson County, 4-3. Jackson also reached the Elite 8 and finished fourth in Class AAA.

In the second game, the Lady Panthers faced a juggernaut from Class AAAAAA, the Alcovy Lady Tigers. Alcovy, the defending

Region 2-AAAAAA Champions, coming off a 28-win season, pulled away late during a 5-0 win over Union.

Tuesday's action began with a 3-1 loss to the Region 8-AAAA Region Runner Up Walnut Grove.

The Lady Warriors won 20 games last season despite facing a brutal schedule.

In the final game, Union County tied Region 8-AAAAA's Winder-Barrow 3-3. Winder was a .500 team last season and were eliminated by Apalachee in the Region Semi-Finals.

Once again, Union turned to the right arms of junior Crystal Busbee and freshman Laken Chambers to keep the opposition in check.

And for the most part, the duo was succesful.

Other than a two-run, two-out triple off Crystal Busbee in Alcovy's last at bat, the pitching staff kept the Lady Panther bats within striking

As the regular season draws near, Coach Stewart likes what she has seen from her Lady Panther squad. The focus this summer was to not only improve their skill-set, but to improve team chemistry. The team has took part in hiking and camping trips, zip-lining, and other activities to bring the squad closer together and build a stronger bond between teammates.

"We did a Panther Pride team camp this year where we took the team bowling, zip lining, hiking and we practiced and played a couple days," Coach Stewart said. "It was awesome for the girls to get to experience things together as a team and bond in many ways than just on the softball field. It really helps the new teammates fit in and come together as a family. I really appreciate The Lady Diamond Club for helping us make that happen for the team."

As for the product that Union County High School will put on the field in August, the Summer League provides an opportunity to put the team in scenarios that can't be simulated anywhere else.

"After all the summer league games, I have a much better understanding of where we are as a team and what we need to continue to work on,' Coach Stewart said. "I got a chance to see most of these girls in game-like situations and how they react which is something that I don't get to always see in practice.' One unique aspect about

the 2014 squad will be the lack of seniors on the roster. Union County softball will have one of its smallest senior classes in school history, but Coach Stewart isn't using that as an excuse.

"I wasn't sure exactly how well we would do with only having six upper classmen, so I knew some of these younger girls would have to step in and fill roles," Coach Stewart said. "I think there are a couple that will step right in and be an immediate help to our varsity squad. Three of the six upperclassman didn't play much varsity last year at all. We only have four returning starters, but thankfully the rest of the girls are ready to go. Summer is extremely important to our program. The summer gives me some time to develop these girls and get them where they need to be for high school ball."

Despite the youth, Union County doesn't ever have to rebuild. Coach Stewart is confident that this team can reach its fourth consecutive Region 8-AA Championship Game. "You can expect them to

play and have the same goals as we do every season," Coach Stewart said. "We want to play for a Region Championship and make it to Columbus. This group, starting with Rich and (Allie) Stroman have a great work ethic. They do not go through the motions. They come out to practice and want to be there and want to get better. Most of the time I have to run this group off the field because they're wanting 'one more' ground ball or 'one more' pitch to hit."

Much of the credit for the pipeline of gifted and more importantly, hard working athletes that Coach Stewart has had at her disposal, belongs to the feeder programs.

"We will be young and we will certainly make some mistakes, but If you're running your middle school, travel, rec league, and junior varsity teams right, then there shouldn't be much rebuilding to do," Coach Stewart said. "I'm very blessed with the softball talent that I have been given. My J.V. practices right along with my varsity. They take the same amount of cuts and ground balls and work just as hard. They are ready to step in their position as soon as that senior graduates. They know their role on J.V. and they know they will get the opportunity to move to the next level." The Lady Panthers will be hosting their annual 100 Inning Game on Saturday beginning at 10 a.m. at the UCHS Softball Complex. Everyone is invited to attend.
