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Q. How many culverts are in the county on county roads?

A. We have been in the process for two years of inventorying all county culverts and determining their condition. This has never been done before. At present, we have about 75% of them inventoried.

The results so far are 2,737 total culverts inventoried with 779 culverts needing im-

mediate attention; 772 need watching; and 1,186 are in good condition.

I hope you can see from all of this information that it is a tremendously difficult job and excellent job that our Road Dept. does. These costs never go down, but only increase and I hope that you can more fully understand when the county is always looking for more innovative ways to fund our transportation network.

divisions we had in last year's show, Horticulture, Youth and Education, we will also have a Design Division this year. The Design Division is also open to the public but requires registration in advance. The classes are Spring Elegance, Summer Iridescence and Fall Abundance each staged in a niche, and Winter Elegance staged on a table with china. If you have never formally entered a floral design, two of these classes are for novices. If you decide to make an entry in the Design Division, please call as soon as possible to register.
