snake. It jumped in the air and crawled into the drainpipe, Officer Walker said.

Officer Walker checked with Animal Control to see if they had a device to get a grip on the rattler – to no avail.

Along came Jimmy Nichols, and he had just the device to help coax the snake out of the drain – golf clubs. "Jimmy had some golf

"Jimmy had some golf clubs in the back of his truck and that's about all we had to get the snake out of the drain," Officer Walker said. "He had a couple of putters and we worked with those and tried to get the snake out of the



Dustin Walker drain." As Officer Walker started working the drain with the putters, the rattler began crawling up the drainpipe.

"We were trying to get a hold on him and pull him back out of the drain – eventually, with time and patience, we got him out of the drain," Officer Walker said.

It was the end of the line for the rattler, which had five rattles and a button.

"We had people on Facebook writing that they hoped we didn't kill the rattlesnake," Officer Walker said. "But, we've got families and small children walking around and a rattlesnake is a very dangerous and poisonous snake. We couldn't take any chances.

"Our job is to make sure people are safe and we made sure of that in this instance," Officer Walker said. "It was three and a half feet long. It was a decent-sized rattlesnake."

Officer Walker said this was one of the most unusual incidents in his four-year career on the force.

"Anytime you're dealing with something like that, you're just focused on how to handle it the best way," he said. "It definitely ranks right

up there as one of my more unusual experiences."

Officer Walker urges residents to watch their surroundings, even in low cut grass because snakes – copperheads and rattlesnakes – are on the prowl this time of year. "You never know," he

"You never know," he said. "I've heard a lot of conversations locally where people are seeing a lot of rattlesnakes. Keep your eyes open." In Hiawassee on Monday, a copperhead was killed after it crawled from the undercarriage of a white van. The incident was in the Towns County Herald parking lot. See this week's Towns County

#### Another bust

In an unrelated case, the Union County Narcotics Squad and Union County sheriff's deputies arrested six males following a report of shots fired on Pat Colwell Road last week, Sheriff Mason said.

"On Aug. 13, Union County 911 dispatch received a complaint of shots fired in the area of Paradise Road off of Pat Colwell Road," Sheriff Mason said. "The caller told dispatch that several persons were shooting across the lake.

"Upon arrival, patrol officers observed six young males outside of a residence. Officers observed various signs of alcohol and suspected drug activity," Sheriff Mason said. "Our narcotics officers were notified and responded to the location. "After a subsequent investigation it was confirmed that numerous drugs were present including Cocaine, MDNA, and marijuana," Sheriff Mason said. "All six males were placed under arrest and transported to Union County Jail."

The six arrested were Forrest Schneider, 18, of Atlanta; Jones Koblinsky, 19, of Atlanta;
