town Blairsville with arts and crafts, live music, storytelling, and a little bit of something for anyone.

If your intentions were to soak up as much mountain living as possible in a two-day span, then Blairsville's Mountain Heritage Festival was there to meet your every need.

The annual event, held on Labor Day weekend is presented by the Historical Society, who since 1976, have sought to preserve the history of Union County, and the Mountain Heritage Festival is one of the ways the Historical Society raises the necessary funds to continue reaching their goals.

One of the primary objectives and largest beneficiary of the Mountain Heritage Festival is the restoration of the Historic Union County Courthouse.

Despite a few passing showers on Saturday and Sunday afternoon, the Festival, overall was a success with crowds pouring in from where ever parking could be found in Downtown.

"The rain didn't last long, it just came long enough to cool off the air, so it has turned out to be a great festival" said Union County Historical Society Volunteer Wanda Gibson.

"This festival raises money for finishing and keeping up the Mock House and the old courthouse. There is an elevator in the old courthouse now thanks to festivals like this," she said.

The Mock House is now the home of the Union County Historical Society's Mountain Life Museum.

The home was donated to the Historical Society in 1994 by the Grapelle Butt-Mock estate.

The museum has

been has been refurbished with 1930 - 40s furniture, much of which has been donated by locals.

The time period was selected because it represents a time when electricity first came to Blairsville from the River Mill on the Nottely River.

"People have donated most of things you see here (in the Mock House) and we put the names of who donated them on each item," Gibson said.

"People will come in here and see the item and say, 'I knew that family,'" she said.

The event featured handmade crafts, traditional foods, music, craft demonstrations that include quilting, spinning, basket making, chair caning, needlework and making rugs.

It also featured old-time music with live performances by talented musicians on autoharp, mandolin, guitar and the fiddle.

All activities are centered around the 1906 Grapelle Mock House, the restored 1861 Payne Family log cabin, the Mauney Family barn, the Duncan Family cabin, and other structures from Union County's storied past.

Other heritage activities historically have included sorghum cane to taste, gold-panning, holding or petting goats, mules, a calf, and lots of chickens.

Free and open to the public, the Mountain Heritage Festival lived up to its promise of wholesome family fun, and teachable moments for all ages.

The Historical Society also holds Friday night concerts and following the Blairsville Jaycee's Sorghum Festival, Christmas will be right around the

Friday concert features Norman Kennedy

The John C. Campbell Folk School in Brasstown will present a concert by Scottish folk singer Norman Kennedy on Friday, September 6 at 7 p.m. in the Festival Barn. Those attending are urged to park near Keith House or the Dining Hall and walk to the Festival Barn where there will be only a limited number of handicapped parking spaces available. Admission is free and donations are welcome.

Norman Kennedy was born in Aberdeen, Scotland, into a family with roots in that port city dating to the 13th century. While learning songs, stories, and lore from family members and neighbors, Kennedy spent part of his teen years "hanging around" the local handweavers.

Kennedy travels the country performing the old songs, telling stories, and teaching traditional weaving techniques. He received a National Heritage Fellowship from the National Endowment for the Arts in 2003 and in
