threat in his community."

Deputy Whittle was transported to Union General Hospital that afternoon before being flown to Erlanger Hospital. Deputy Whittle had

served with the Union County Sheriff's Office for less than one year.

In May 2012, the Union County Sheriff's Office retired Badge 221, the one worn by the

38-year-old deputy.

Deputy Whittle's service revolver also was retired and presented to the Whittle family along with the fallen deputy's uniform.

illegal drug activity is just the beginning, said Sheriff Mason, who took office in

January. "We're making sure that the only people to profit from the illegal drug trafficking will be the tax-payers of Union County through seizures of the illgotten gains by drug deal-

ers," Sheriff Mason said. "It's our job to make sure that drug dealers bypass our community, and find another place to do business," the sheriff said.

Union County. "This is good news provided that we're being noticed by the drug people," he said. "The lack of plants

tells me that these individuals that have grown marijuana in the mountains in the past now have a fear of

being caught," he said. "In the past, there have been large fields of marijuana found in Union County," he said

"Because there is so much money involved in drug trafficking, people take risks and violate the law," he said. "We're going to do

our very best to deter these types of operations," the sheriff said.

"If anyone decides to make marijuana their cash crop, we're going to do our best to harvest it for them.
