# Panthers put up 21 in fourth to pull away at Andrews

Andrews, NC - For more than three quarters the Panthers (2-1) were living dangerously.

Early in the fourth, Union was clinging to a 13-6 lead, on the road, with the offense sputtering, and a defense who had been on the field way too long.

Facing poor position following a block in the back on the Panthers, the offense was staring at a long field.

That's when Union went 80 yards on six plays, giving the Panthers some breathing room

The scoring drive was sparked by a 62-yard pass from sophomore quarterback Joseph Mancuso to sophomore wide out Sam Gilbert on 3rd-and-16. A false start penalty

moved Union back 5 yards but on the ensuing play, Mancuso found Sam Gilbert once again. this time on 21-yard scoring strike with 6:06 to play.

Sophomore Jake Walts kick was good, despite repeated late hits on the Panther kicker.

The personal fouls on Union's kicker only backfired on the Wildcats as Union took off their belts and took Andrews behind the woodshed for a good old fashioned whipping.

After a touchback by T.J. Smith, the defense forced a quick fumble at the Wildcat 35-yard line, setting up the Panthers with a short field.

Mancuso found Robert Prunier for 30 yards, giving Union 1st-and goal at the five.

One play later, sophomore Nick Whittle found the endzone. Walts again connected on the PAT despite another cheap shot. Instead of letting emotion get the better of them, Union shot back with another touchdown pass for good measure with 4:26

The defense limited Andrews to one-yard in three plays, bringing up a punt.

Junior Robert Prunier's punt return gave Union a 1st-

line. One play later, Mancuso hit a streaking Jacob Rogers down the far sideline for a 42-yard touchdown, Mancuso's fourth score of the game, and Rogers'

The Wildcats added a for 9 yards, Whittle carried for garbage score with just over a minute to play, bringing the final self for a 9-yard rush. score to 34-12.


After allowing a pair of first downs, the Panther defense got a fourth down stop at their own 44-yard line.

thers' next series wiped out a first down bringing up another punt.

The Wildcats would then go 85 yards on 12 plays, cutting the Panther lead to 13-6 at the 11:08 mark of the fourth quarter. We didn't tackle particularly well and then we hit that lull in the third quarter where they (Andrews) had the ball for a long time. For the game our defense was on the field for 62 plays and

Mancuso finished 14-of-20 for 314 yards and three scores. Drake was 1-for-3 for 11 yards and rushed five times for 21 Sam Gilbert caught four

balls for 101 yards, Prunier caught five passes for 71 yards and rushed for 10 yards, Whittle had two grabs, also for 71 yards. He carried 12 times for 70 yards. Rogers had six catches for 65 yards and Brett Dietz had one catch for 17 yards. Union County has the

"We'll wait until next Monday to get ready for Washington-Wilkes," Coach Allison said. "We've got some corrections that we need to make ourselves.
