

Lady Panthers look to get back on track as they host 2nd place Wilkes for Senior Night

The Lady Panthers (16-6, 6-2) traveled to Social Circle for an 8-AA doubleheader on Sept. 8th, and after 9 errors in two games, came out on the wrong end of a sweep, dropping Union from first to third place in region play.

The first meeting was all Union, holding a 5-1 advantage with two innings to play, until the Lady Redskins took advantage of two errors, while using a pair of bunt singles to cut the Lady Panthers' lead to 5-3.

In the bottom of the seventh, Social Circle continued to roll as Union continued to fold.

With nobody out, the Lady Redskins loaded the bases after Union gift-wrapped all three base runners.

A two-run single tied the game, then an errant throw home allowed the winning run to score.

With a chance to take out their frustrations on the home team in the second contest, the Lady Panthers suffered their first shutout of the season and were mercy-ruled after four innings by a score of 12-0. The 12-run loss marked the first time since 2005, and the first time under Head Coach Jessica Stewart that Union has been mercy-ruled in region play — a streak that spanned 135 games.

The Lady Panthers were able to put Social Circle in the rear view and finish 2-2 against much larger schools, despite committing 16 total errors at the Cherokee County Invitational Tournament in Woodstock, beginning on Sept. 11.

In the first contest, the Lady Panthers fell 6-1 to Max-Preps' 12th ranked team in the nation, the Cherokee Lady Warriors from Canton. Cherokee currently sports a 17-2 overall record with an 8-0 mark in Region 5-AAAAA.

Union recorded its lone run in the second inning but Cherokee scored all six of its runs in the fourth.

The Lady Panthers followed the loss with back-to-back wins over teams that also hail from Region 5-AAAAA. The first win was a 3-0 shutout of Pope (11-1 overall) and then an 8-4 victory over Milton (1-5 in region play). In the final game on Saturday afternoon,

Union fell 4-0 to Gilmer, who they defeated earlier in the season.

"I was concerned that the loss at Social Circle would carry over but I think the girls regrouped," Coach Stewart said. "I thought we did fairly well at Woodstock considering we were playing some big schools. I would've liked to went 4-0 but the 2-2 split wasn't a disappointment.

"We played Cherokee who is AAAAAA and ranked and lost 6-1, and also lost to AAAA Gilmer. We beat Pope and Milton who were both good teams.

The Lady Panthers had last week off to make corrections before hosting Washington Wilkes on Tuesday. The Lady Tigers are currently 7-1 in 8-AA and tied with Social Circle for first place. Union needs a sweep to finish in second place in region-play, while a split — or worse — would result in a third place finish and road trips in the Region Semi Finals and the Championship Game, should they advance past the semis.

"I like for the girls to get to see live pitching at least a couple times a week so the week off may effect us some but I hope that we got some of our defensive kinks out in practice last week," Coach Stewart said. "I would love to go into the Region Tournament as the No. 2 seed and get a chance to play in the Region Championship again this year.

Lady Panthers 5 Social Circle 6

Social Circle - Despite outitting the Lady Redskins 9-to-6, Union was unable to hold on to a 5-1 lead, surrendering 5 runs in the final two innings that resulted in a 6-5 walk-off win for Social Circle, who entered the doubleheader in third place in 8-AA.

The Lady Panthers allowed two bunt singles and an error to load the bases in the bottom of the sixth. A ground out to shortstop Kendra Tanner brought in one run but Laken Chambers mowed down the ensuing on three straight pitches for the second out. Un-

fortunately, another Union error allowed the Lady Redskins to tack on another run and trim the deficit to 5-3.

The bottom of the seventh opened in similar fashion as two fielding errors, followed by a mental blunder, loaded the bases once again. A single to center brought home the tying run and a overthrow of the catcher on the relay scored the game-winner.

Social Circle drew first blood in the bottom of the first with a leadoff single, two stolen bases, and an RBI ground out made it a 1-0 game.

Union tied the game in the second when sophomore Jillian Lawn blasted the first pitch of the inning from sophomore lefty Kayla Spinks, over the left field fence for a solo homer.

The Lady Panthers put up four more in the third when Lydia Arrowood and Braden Poteete opened the inning with bunt singles. Tanner reached on an error that scored Arrowood and Chambers scored Poteete and Tanner with an opposite field single. Lawn, who drove in Union's first run of the game, would drive in the final run with a sacrifice fly that scored courtesy runner Ellie Garrison.

Chambers got out of trouble in the fourth without any damage following a hit-by-pitch and a double to open the inning.

The Lady Panthers missed an opportunity to put the game away when they couldn't manufacture a run despite an Aladriel Arnold double and Courtney Moose single to put two in scoring position with nobody out.

Chambers struck out five while giving up two earned runs in 6-plus innings of work in the loss.

Lady Panthers 0 Social Circle 12

Social Circle - Union allowed nine hits and five errors during a 12-0 blowout loss at Social Circle.

The home team got a run in each of the first two innings, two runs in the third and eight in the fourth. Meanwhile, the Lady Panthers could only muster one hit off the bat of Arnold.

Lawn reached on a free pass for Union's only other base runner of the contest. Chambers allowed 9 runs but only one was earned. She also gave up 7 hits, a walk, while fanning three. The other three runs belonged to Lawn, who entered with two outs in the fourth.

Lady Panthers 1 Cherokee 6

Woodstock - Against the high powered Lady Warriors, Arrowood finished with a 2-for-3 day, while Lawn

walked and scored Union's only run.

Chambers and Arnold also recorded base hits to round out all of the Lady Panthers' offense.

Chambers went the distance from the circle allowing only one earned run and five hits with three strikeouts.

Lady Panthers 3 Pope 0

Woodstock - Union got a run in the first, one in the fifth, and one in the sixth as they shutout Pope from Class AAAAAA.

Chambers tossed a complete game three-hitter without giving up a walk.

Nix and Garrett each had two hits in the game with an RBI going to Nix, Lawn drove in a run with a double.

Sutton singled and Poteete scored a run.

Lady Panthers 8 Milton 4

Woodstock - Garrett, and Kendra Tanner were a wrecking crew.

Garrett was 2-for-4 with 3 RBIs and a double while Kendra Tanner finished 2-for-3 with a run, a double, 2 RBIs, and a pair of walks.

Nix put up some not-so-shabby numbers as well, going 3-for-5 with a run, a double, and an RBI.

Arnold had a 2-for-4 game with an RBI, Lawn was 2-for-4 with a run, Arrowood also finished 2-for-4 with a run.

Junior Channa Carroll went 1-for-2 with 2 runs and an RBI. Poteete and Chambers both singled and Sutton scored a run.

Chambers and Lawn each pitched and only one of their 8 runs were earned. Lawn struck out four in 5.2 innings and Chambers fanned three in 1.1 innings.

Lady Panthers 0 Gilmer County 4

Woodstock - Union could only muster four base hits with Nix, Lawn, Garrett, and Sutton getting one single a piece.

Chambers whiffed 9 in 7 innings without giving up an earned run. The junior right hander scattered six hits and issued one free pass.

Hamlin wins first Chase Race

JOLIET, Ill. — Denny Hamlin overcame a big hurdle to win Sunday's Sprint Cup race. Hamlin spun on lap 2 of the 267-lap race, after another car ahead of him had lost control. This caused him to go a lap down, but he fought his way back to the front.

He was fourth on the race's last restart with six laps remaining. He passed the leader Kurt Busch during lap 264, and held off Carl Edwards for his first win of the season, which automatically guarantees him a spot in the second round of the Chase.

"I was hoping everything would work out on that last restart, and it did," said Hamlin. "Coming back from a lap down is incredible. I knew if we could get back to the front we could win."

Carl Edwards led six laps, but ran out of laps before he could catch Hamlin.

"We're very satisfied with our team today," said Edwards. "We had a fast car, but the way things worked out there at the end, this was the best we could do."

Kurt Busch was leading the race when the last caution came out and finished third.

"Overall, we're happy with this team," said Busch. "The caution was the one thing we did not need. It messed us up."

Ryan Newman was fourth, followed by Matt Kenseth, Joey Logano, Kyle Larson, Brad Keselowski, Kyle Busch, and Aric Almirola.

There was a physical confrontation between Kevin Harvick and Jimmie Johnson immediately after the race. Johnson went over to Harvick's hauler in an attempt to clear the air, but Harvick came out and shoved him in the chest. It all stemmed from a bumping incident during a restart on lap 127. Johnson had tried to pass on the inside of Harvick, and scraped the left side of Harvick's No. 4 Chevrolet.

Ten laps later, Harvick's left rear tire blew out, forcing him into the outside wall, and damaging his car. He had to pit for repairs and lost 56 laps.

"I had gotten a good restart and he (Johnson) just slammed into me like I wasn't even there," said Harvick.

Johnson finished 11th, while Harvick was 42nd.

Jeff Gordon led twice for 41 laps, but got bottled up on the last restart and wound up 14th.

Kyle Busch won his 74th Xfinity Series race Saturday as he held off a hard charging Matt Kenseth at Chicagoland Speedway.

Busch led 102 laps of the 200-lap race, but near the end, it appeared Kenseth might be able to overtake him. Two laps from the finish lap traffic interfered with Kenseth's driving line and he had to settle for second.

"Those last few laps were pretty cool," said Busch, who started on the pole. "We weren't all that much faster at the beginning, but we kept getting better and better after each pit stop."

"But I got nervous there at the end. Matt (Kenseth) was coming on pretty strong."

Both Busch and Kenseth finished the race in first and second, the same position they started from.

"Kyle had the fastest car," said Kenseth. "I tried hard, but some lap cars got between us and I lost my momentum."

HOW THE CHASE WILL WORK

The 2015 Chase to determine the Sprint Cup champion will consist of four parts.

The first three races are called the Challenger round. The 16 eligible drivers will compete in races at Chicago, New Hampshire and Dover for 12 spots available in the next round. A win at any of the three races advances the winning driver into the next round.

The rest of the field of 12 will be determined by order of total points scored after the three races. Each advancing driver will be reset to 3,000 points, no bonus points for wins.

Round number two will be known as the Contender. The 12 drivers who advance from the Challenger round will compete at Charlotte, Kansas and Talladega for eight spots available in the next round, with the same rules for advancing as in the Challenger round. Each advancing driver will be reset to 4,000 points, no bonus points for wins.

The next three races will be the Eliminator round. Eight drivers advance to races at Martinsville, Texas and Phoenix and compete for four spots in the final round. The same rules will be used for advancing as in previous rounds. Points for the four drivers going for the championship are reset to 5,000, no bonus points for wins.

The final Championship round will be decided by the driver with the best finish among the top four at Homestead, the last race of the season.
