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Coosa United Methodist Church celebrates 180th Homecoming

Sept. 28 marks the 180th anniversary of Homecoming at Coosa United Methodist Church off Mulky Gap Road.

Union County Sole Commissioner Lamar Paris has declared that day as Coosa United Methodist Church Homecoming Day in Union

County. "Coosa Methodist Church stands today due to the love and devotion of its present members," Commissioner Paris said. "The standards that stood 180 years ago are the same standards that will be in place at Coosa's 200th Homecoming Celebration.'

On Sept. 28, Coosa UMC will celebrate 180 years of Homecoming with a celebratory service at 10 a.m.

at the church on Mulky Gap Road. An Old Time Singing will be held at 7 p.m. on Sept. 27 to celebrate the occasion of Homecoming.

Devout Methodist Charles Duncan, who moved to the Coosa District in 1833 from Buncombe County, NC with his wife Mary Ford Duncan and their 12 children, started the church in 1834. The Duncan family had migrated to North Carolina from Buckingham County, VA in the early 1800s.

It is believed that the first church service at Coosa happened on the Duncan Family property near the present day location of Duncan Cemetery off Fairview Church Road.

In Coosa History, a compilation of significant happenings in the church, it is written that like many small

country churches. Coosa began when a group of faithful Christians saw a need and, following the lead of the Lord,

rose to the occasion. Many of them had little education and little money. The congregation worked

the ground for a living and to stay alive. The Coosa Church family worked hard, but more importantly, they remained faithful.

While the early settlers of this congregation may seem far removed in time and culture, their spirit still guides the life of the congregation even today.

The early years featured some of the county's legendary circuit rider Methodist ministers, a group that included the Rev. William Cotter, the Rev. Milford G. Hamby, and the Rev. Thomas Coke Hughes.

The latter, affectionately known as "Uncle Tom Coke," was considered to be the father of Methodism in Blairsville and Union County. Rev. Hughes was born in Union County in 1844 and

died in 1932. He gave his life in service to the Mountains of North Georgia, not only as a dedicated Methodist minister, but also as a representative in the Georgia State House, Clerk of Court, and as a trustee of Young Harris College.

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Coosa United Methodist Church where it is today was built in 1865. The church building was typical of small churches of the era, simple, Spartan and utilitarian, but nestled in a location accessible to the membership by foot or by horse and buggy.

In 1875, a deed was recorded at the Union County Courthouse for the land where the current church still exists today. It was deeded by David Newton Duncan. John Ledford and Wellborn

Three charged in shoplifting capers

A Mineral Bluff man and two North Carolina women are behind bars following a chase by a private citizen, Blairsville police and a Union County Sheriff's deputy.

The Sept. 5 incident began at Wal-Mart off Kiutuestia Creek Road as Angela Freeman, Elizabeth Donaldson and Scott Cable attempted to flee the store after Donaldson and Cable allegedly shoplifted welding tools from the store, Union County Sheriff Mack Mason said.

Freeman is from Andrews, NC, and Donaldson is from Murphy, NC, Sheriff Mason said.

'The person reporting the theft was a private citizen, Sheriff Mason said. "That individual followed those three as they fled the store parking lot in a pickup truck. The private citizen stayed behind the fleeing pickup truck until deputies pulled the vehicle over

Once the pickup stopped, Cable jumped from the vehicle and attempted to elude law enforcement on foot, Sheriff Mason said.

"Deputy Dustin Walker and Blairsville Police Officer Seth Dyer pursued the suspect on foot and apprehended him after a short chase," Sheriff Mason said.

The Daffodil Project is coming to Meeks Parks.

The project's goal is to plant 1.5 million daffodils worldwide in memory of the 1.5 million children who died in the Holocaust, said Project Coordinator Mike Weinroth.

During the Holocaust, million children died senselessly in Nazi occupied Europe. "No one knows what kind of lives these children would have gone on to lead," Weinroth said. "Their potential for growth and fulfillment was cut short. We aspire to build a Living Holocaust Memorial by planting 1.5 million daffodils around the world to remember the children."

A 600-bulb daffodil garden was planted last November in Blue Ridge.

Union County Sole Commissioner Lamar Paris said it's an honor to be a part of the project.
