UCMS Panthers whip Basin, gearing up for finale at Lumpkin

Union County Middle School football team has one game left in the regular season, and it's a big one.

After throttling Copper Basin, Tenn. 34-6 last week, the Panthers return to league play on Thursday when they travel to Lumpkin County for a battle to determine second place and home field advantage in the first round of the playoffs.

During Union's tuneup game with Copper Basin, the Panthers pounced on the Cougars early for a 28-0 lead

Nic Rodriguez scored two touchdowns. His first was a 3-vard touchdown run, right up the gut. His second was a pick-6 that he took back 65-yards for a score. He also returned the opening kick 95-yards for a touchdown but had it called back because of a block-in-theback penalty.

Quarterback Bo Lynch was his usual self, rushing for a 48-yard touchdown in the second quarter. Meanwhile, Micah Gilbert scored from 15 yards out for Union's final score of the half. Seventh grader Cole

Wright scored from 20 yards out during the third quarter to make it a 34-0 game.


Kicker Parker McCombs connected on four extra point attempts for the Panthers.

"We played well but started a little slow because of turnovers and penalties," Coach Casey Jones said. "Those are mistakes we've got to fix before we face a team like Lump-

After Rodriguez's kick return was called back, Union suffered from a bad snap and was forced into a punting situation. On Basin's first play from scrimmage, the Panther defense forced a fumble that set up the Panthers at the Cougar 33-yard line. However, two plays later, Union would suffer from a another bad snap and would turn the ball back over to the







The Panther defense would respond by forcing Basin into another three-and-out before their punt was partially blocked by the Panthers, giving Union ideal field position – 31 yards from pay dirt.

On the first play Lynch hit Zach Stone on a screen that was taken 28 yards before he stepped out of bounds at the 3-vard line. On the next play, Union didn't try anything fancy and gave the ball to Rodriguez and the Panther running back powered his way into the end

After Basin took over on its own 24-yard line, two plays later Stone snatched a Cougar pass at midfield but Union's offense was unable to convert rush. on fourth down and handed the ball back to the Cougars.

As the second quarter started and the teams flipped ends of the field, the Panthers also flipped the switch and the rout was on.

Rodriguez's interception was returned for a touchdown and 15 seconds into the quarter, Union led 14-0. On the ensuing kickoff,

McCombs' perfectly placed pooch-kick was recovered by Rodriguez. Facing a third-and-15, Lynch took off and scored from 48 yards out to give Union a 21-0 advantage with 6:46 remaining in the half. Basin would fumble
