"We are honored that The Wall will be located in our own Meeks Park," Union County Sole Commissioner Lamar Paris said. "It will be located on the hill just to the right after entering the Park.

"There will be extra park-

ing on Saturday and Sunday at the Industrial Park on Airport Road," Paris said. "There will be shuttle buses and vans there to transport people to The Wall and back to their car.

The Wall will be located in Meeks Park, near the pool, and is free to all people.

When you visit please remember the Wall is a solemn place, dedicated to the 58,307 men and women who died in service to their country.

There are a total of 30 names listed on the Wall from Union, Towns, Lumpkin, Fannin and White counties in Georgia and Cherokee and Clay counties in North Caro-

46th Annual Sorghum Festival Parade

For more than two decades, Charles Worden has been coordinating parades within Union County – and the 46th Annual Sorghum Festival Parade this Saturday, Oct. 10.

Worden, who retired at the first of the year as Union County Fire Chief after 21 years on the job, still holds the posts of Union County EMA director and 911 direc-

"Parade routes are always the same, with the exception of the Christmas Parade, and it takes a shorter route," said Worden.



Starting at 11 a.m. that Saturday, Oct. 10, the Sorghum Festival Parade will make its way from the Old Middle School Gym on School Circle and around to Cleveland Street. From there, it will take a right to the Blairsville Square and go 3/4 of the way around the square and out Blue Ridge

Then, the parade will take a right onto Earnest Street, followed by another right onto Georgia 515, where it will go until it reaches Harris Street to take a right at the U.S. Post Office.

From there, the parade will make a left between the Old Fort Sorghum and

Joshua Ryan Lowe faces five drug charges and one weapons charge in Towns County and faces a burglary charge in Union County with more charges

on Friday, Sept. 25. Lowe was charged with Violation of Georgia's Controlled Substance Act on charges that include possession of methamphetamine with intent to distribute, two



counts possession of Schedule IV controlled substance, possession of Schedule III controlled substance, possession of dangerous drugs, possession of marijuana less than 1 ounce, and possession of a firearm during the commission of a crime,

UCSO collects more than \$62,000 from drug seizures

The Union County Sheriff's Office has collected \$62,615.87 through two recent drug arrests, convictions and subsequent seizures, according to Union County Sheriff Mack Mason.

Money awarded through drug seizures goes into a fund to provide the Sheriff's office with necessary equipment such as cars and other law enforcement equipment that is not budgeted by the county.

The two seizures stem from the two narcotic investigations and subsequent ar-

An investigation into suspected illegal drug sales resulted in the arrest and prosecution of Robert and Joanne Hughes. At the completion of the investigation, both Robert and Joanne Hughes were arrested on Feb. 19, 2015, and subsequently charged and convicted with distribution of a controlled substance, methamphetamine. Robert Hughes received

a sentence of 20 years, with





10 years to be served in prison and the remaining 10 to be served on probation.

Joanne Hughes received a sentence of 15 years on pro-

Property seized from Robert and Joanne Hughes included a Ford F-150 truck, a Nissan Stanza car, a Kawasaki Mule and a Kawasaki Motorcycle, including \$5,926.12 in currency, as well as guns and other items.

After the award and disposition of the seized property, the case netted a total of See Seized, Page 3A
