interest, there have been 44 names already added to the memorial. For more information on this lovely memorial, please contact Kathy Malone at (706) 835-1303.

Q. I heard that we have a dog park as part of Meeks Park and that we are one of the few counties to have such a park. Is that true?

A. It is accurate that we have a great dog park and that it is one of the best and only one in the area. Actually, the trail system of 1.18 miles is a joint use trail for the dogs as well as walkers/joggers. It is connected to the main Meeks Park trails by a joint use trail running under Hwy 515. It is also home to the Disc Golf

Q. What in the world is disc golf and who can play it? Does it have anything to do with those funny metal chain baskets that I have seen over at the dog park?

A. Disc golf is a game in which individual players throw a flying disc (similar to a Frisbee) into a basket or at a target. According to the Professional Disc Golf Association, "The object of the game is to traverse a course from beginning to end in the fewest number of throws of the disc.'

It is loosely based on golf. As a player progresses down the fairway, he or she must make each consecutive shot from the spot where the previous throw has landed. The trees, shrubs, and terrain changes located in and around the fairways provide challenging obstacles for the golfer. Finally, the "putt" (usually a short throw) lands the disc in the chain basket and the hole is completed.

Q. Is Disc Golf as fun as regular golf?

A. Disc golf shares the same joys and frustrations of traditional golf, whether it's sinking a long putt or hitting a tree halfway down the fairway. However, there are many differences. Disc golf rarely requires a greens fee, you probably won't need to rent a cart, and you never get stuck with a bad "tee time." Disc golf is designed to be enjoyed by people of all ages, male and female, regardless of economic status. It is free!!

Q. Are these additional recreational opportuni-ties, such as disc golf, good for our health? A. More people are

taking up recreational activities in an effort to improve health and quality of life. Disc golf provides upper and lower body conditioning, aerobic exercise, and promotes a combination of physical and mental abilities that allow very little risk of physical injury. It is a great family game for all ages. Concentration skills increase by mastering shots and negotiating obstacles. Players of limited fitness levels can start slowly and gradually increase their level of play as fitness improves. Like other parts of Meeks Park, the course is professionally designed and is earning an exceptional reputation in the Southeastern United States. For more information, contact Larry Conley at 706-
