The businesses doling out candy included Ace Hardware, Home PC Services, Coldwell Bankers, Alpha Drug testing services, and Blairsville Cinema.

Three years ago, Blairsville Cinema came under new management. Since then, the Cinema has been attending the Hometown Halloween event.

Its setup was colorful

and varied, with pumpkins painted as characters from the movies *Monsters Inc.* and *Despicable Me*.

"Since most of the audience is younger, they don't really ask about the movies," said Blairsville Cinema employee Josh Kamber. "We just give them candy, and we give them popcorn bags. They can come by Blairsville Cinema and get free popcorn in the bag up until Oct. 31."

Brenda Bryant, who has been with Ace Hardware for 16 years, noted that Hometown Halloween is less a business opportunity and more of a chance to express humble gratitude for the business the community has given them.

"It's just a way to give back to the community and everything, and we enjoy it," she said. "We have a lot of people that like to volunteer."

She also enjoys seeing the assortment of masks and disguises and noticing the creativity and work that goes into each costume.

"We had a headless guy, it was a little boy, he comes walking up and at first we thought it was just a veil over his face, and then we noticed the bloody stump," she laughed. "It was really neat."

Professor Amanda Lawrence, who teaches at Young Harris College, enjoys the opportunity to take her two sons trick-or-treating, but also enjoys seeing the assortment of costumes, ranging from scary to funny.

"I saw a really scary bride and groom," she said. "It was adults."

Lawrence's favorite thing about Hometown Halloween was seeing everyone gather and enjoy him- or herself. She likes "seeing the whole community come out and have such a great time together."


"This year's Costume Contest was a big success," he said. "We had to limit the contest to 55 participants because we didn't anticipate the turn out of contestants we had for this year."
