Early voting ends Friday; more than 4,200 cast ballots

The 2012 election cycle could be the best in years for Union County.

When early voting concludes on Friday, more than 5,000 registered voters already could have cast ballots before the Nov. 6th General Election.

More than 4,200 have already cast ballots, including 400 returned absentee ballots. On Saturday, 182 registered voters cast ballots, according to Chief Registrar Robert

Whether it's the Presidential race between Incumbent Barack Obama and



challenger Mitt Romney, the sheriff's race between Incumbent Scott Stephens and challenger Mack Mason, or the Charter School Amendment, also known as Amendment I, voters are turning out in re-

eral other decisions to make as they cast their final ballot of the 2012 Election season.

They must decide two Public Service Commissioner posts, choose a new 9th District Congressman and decide their choice for Georgia House District 8 state repre-

In the local races, almost all local seats are up for

The comfort zone for incumbents in the Nov. 6th election is zero, except for Clerk of Superior Court, Judy Odom, Probate Judge Dwain Brackett and Chief Magistrate Johnnie Garmon.

Judge Brackett and Judge Garmon were reelected during the July 31 primary. Odom is unopposed on the November ballot.

More than 37 percent of Union County registered voters turned out for the primaries. Expect that number to more than double during the Nov. 6th election.

On the Union County General Election ballot, Democratic Incumbent Sheriff Scott Stephens faces Republican challenger Mack Mason. Both were uncontested on their respective ballots.

Republican Lee Knight and Democrat Larry Trulove face off for tax commissioner. Both were uncontested on their respective ballots. GOP Incumbent Coro-

ner Benny Erwin faces Deputy Coroner Benny Brookshire, a Blairsville Democrat. Both were uncontested on their respective ballots. Democrat and Sole

Union County Commissioner Lamar Paris faces Republican Charles Rich. Both were unopposed on their respective party ballots.

Incumbent Democratic District 1 Board of Education member Gary Davenport and Republican political newcomer Patricia Bertuna face off. Both were uncontested on their respective primaries.

Democratic District 3 **BOE Incumbent Carlton Col**lins faces Republican Cynthia Byers. Both were uncontested on their respective primaries.

In the District 8 State House race, Incumbent Stephen Allison, a Blairsville Republican, faces Democrat Jana Hill of Clayton. Both were uncontested on their respective primaries.

In District 51 State Senate, Incumbent Steve Gooch, a Dahlonega Republican, is

BOE says vote 'no' to Amendment I

House Bill 1162 has the Union County Board of Education worried. The Board believes

it should have every public school in the state on the edge A proposed constitu-

tional amendment on the Nov. 6th General Election ballot would overturn a 2011 Georgia Supreme Court decision that ruled it unconstitutional for the state to create charter schools without local board

Reacting to the proposed amendment, the Union County Board of Education passed a resolution asking state officials to recommit to adequately funding K-12 education without taking money away for charter or private schools.

Union County Schools Superintendent Gary Steppe said if the amendment passes that the school system would lose money to state-approved charter schools and simultaneously have no control over operation.

He declined further comment because of the recent series of lawsuits aimed at preventing public school officials from lobbying against the amendment. State School Superintendent

Union County Sheriff's Detectives have cracked what they believe to be a one-man crime wave in Blairsville and Union County.

With one arrest, sheriff's detectives cleared eight commercial break ins and recovered some important financial documents stolen from a local church, sheriff's detectives said.

Authorities say that one-man crime wave was Daby Waddell Loflin.

Loflin is believed to be the culprit who broke into Coosa Water Authority, Heavenly Hands, the local bowling alley, Classic Cuts, the Chiropractic Health Center, Sicily Pizza, Dan's Grill and the Blairsville Church of God. He's under investigation in at least one other commercial break in, sheriff's

During an extensive investigation and some good old fashioned police work, sheriff's detectives zeroed in on Loflin, Union County Sheriff

Scott Stephens said. Detectives searched state probation and parole records to see if there were any career criminals living in the county but were on parole or probation, sheriff's reports
