unopposed.

In the 9th Congressional District Race, voters must choose between Republican Doug Collins and Democrat Jody Cooley, both of Gainesville, for the newly redistricted Congressional seat.

In the races for Public Service Commissioner, Incumbent Chuck Eaton faces challengers Stephen Oppenheimer and Brad Ploeger. Also, Incumbent Stan Wise takes on David Staples.

In the Presidential race, Democratic President Barack Obama and Vice President Joe Biden are challenged by Republican Mitt Romney and his running mate Paul Ryan. Libertarian Gary Johnson and his running mate James Gray also are on the ballot. There are two proposed Constitutional Amendments on the ballot.

First, voters are asked to agree to public school charter options. Should the Charter School amendment on the Nov. 6 ballot pass, it essentially brings an end to home rule by our local Board of Education. A yes vote generates a new unfunded mandate by the state, and creates a situation where local school boards will have to increase millage rates to continue funding public schools. It also leads to charter school funding stripping public schools of the raw materials to make each successful. It's a loselose for taxpayers.

Second, Amendment No. 2 supposedly allows Georgia to save taxpayer dollars through multi-year real estate agreements. The belief is that this amendment would reduce the state's operating costs. It allows agencies to enter into multi-year deals, where as now they're obligated to only enter into one-year deals, thus, taking away the state's negotiating powers. A no vote is the popular choice on this amendment because one-year contracts are believed to provide a more competitive edge.

Polls open on Election Day at 7 a.m. and close at 7 p.m. for precinct voting.
