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Panthers hold off Riverside 29-14 on Senior Night

The Panthers picked up their eighth win of the season on Senior Night following a 29-14 victory over a scrappy Riverside Military Academy squad that refused to go away despite falling behind 29-7.

The win guarantees the Panthers can finish no lower than third in 8-AA and are a win over Washington Wilkes away from placing second and hosting the first round of State. It was also the 29th win for the 2015-16 senior class, equaling the 1977-78 class for the winningest class in team history.

Senior quarterback Joseph Mancuso got the start after suffering a knee injury at Rabun County two weeks ago. Wearing a brace on his left knee, the Richmond commit wasn't 100 percent but still threw for three scores in the win.

He would finish the game 16-for-30 with 266 yards passing. The injury limited his rushing numbers but he still averaged 11 yards-per-carry with 44 yards on four carries. The Eagle defense tested

Mancuso's mobility by blitzing early and often but he was able to escape the pressure. Union's first touchdown came with Mancuso throwing on the run and hitting senior Andrew Brown in the back of the endzone.

Mancuso then hit senior Sam Gilbert for a two-point conversion to make it an 8-0 game.

But for the most part, the Riverside defense kept the Panthers offense in check limiting them to two scores, but the difference was a pick-6 by Brown and a fake field goal by Knox Kiernan that led to another touchdown.

"I don't think the offense was clicking on all cylinders," Union Head Coach Brian Allison said. "We were just a little out of rhythm. We missed a couple of throws and catches. There were three situations where we had a touchdown but didn't finish."

Leading 8-0, following the interception of a Mancuso pass, Brown returned the favor by picking off a Riverside pass, breaking several tackles, and weaving his way 25 yards to pay dirt with just over 2 minutes to play in the first quarter.

In the second frame, a Union fumble awarded the ball to the Eagles at the Panthers 28yard line. Facing a 3rd-and-8, Riverside completed a pass that was good for 17-yards and a first down. On second down, an 11-yard completion put the Eagles on the board – making it a 15-7 game.

A holding penalty derailed Union's ensuing drive and they were forced to punt it back to Riverside with 1:46 left before



The Panthers set up shop at the Eagles' 45-yard line with 40 seconds left and on the first play, Mancuso hit a streaking Kiernan down the middle of the field for a 45-yard scoring

On Riverside's opening possession of the second half, Banton recovered a fumble and Union took over at midfield.

The offense would drive inside the Eagles' 5-yard line but an interception in the endzone on 4th-and-goal kept the Panthers from extending the lead.

Another sack by Banton forced a three-and-out and senior Josh Daniel returned the punt to the Riverside 34-yard line, then a personal foul moved the Panthers inside the 20-yard line. The drive would stall and on 4thand-2 from the 11, and Kiernan lined up for a 28-yard field goal attempt.

fell incomplete.

With 7:04 on the clock, the Eagles had plenty of time to make it a ball game and it appeared they would trim the Union lead after a deflected pass fell into the arms of a Riverside receiver for a 30-yard gain.

An offsides penalty on the Panthers was followed by a first down run and then a 16-yard completion put the Eagles inside the 20-yard line. An incompletion on first down was followed by an intentional grounding flag that made it 3rd-and-19. Riverside was dropped for a short loss on third down, bringing up a 4th-and-20 at the Union 25-

Columbus - During Union's opening game with eventual the eventual champion Gordon Lee, the Lady Panthers lost the ace of their pitching staff when junior Laken Chambers aggravated an ankle injury that limited her in her team's Sweet 16 sweep of Lamar County.

However, the 31-1 Gordon Lee Lady Trojans were an entirely different monster than what Union (25-9) had faced during the previous round. Despite sophomore Jillian Lawn's best efforts, Gordon Lee proved too much and breezed past the Lady Panthers by a score of 12-2.

"Gordon Lee was a very good team and went on to win the state championship so that was a tough draw right off the bat," Union County Head Coach Jessica Stewart said. "They had a very good pitcher and we managed to only get one hit off her and one hit off their No. 2 (pitcher). Laken being injured hurt us, we were off mentally because of that.'

Falling into the loser's bracket meant Union would be in action at 9 a.m. the following morning vs Seminole County.
