

Panthers fend off Wilkes; host State on Friday

Dietz's fourth quarter heroics secure the No. 2 seed and a 35-34 victory

The Panthers are 9-1 and hosting the first round of the State playoffs for the first time since 2001 after surviving a relentless comeback attempt from Washington Wilkes on Senior Night.

With emotions running high, especially late in the game, juniors Joseph Mancuso and Sam Gilbert played an integral role in the win. However, when it came down to crunch time, it was the seniors that saved the day.

Senior Brett Dietz led the team with 12 solo tackles and 6 assists but did most of his damage by blocking a would-be extra point - keeping Union on top at 35-34.

"He got around the end and it was just a great effort on his part," Union County Head Coach Brian Allison said. "It seems like the bigger the moment or the bigger the challenge, the harder our kids

Later in the fourth quarter, he recovered a fumble forced by fellow senior Luke Chatham at the Panthers' 11yard line with 1:03 to play.

Dietz would also finish with two catches for 50 yards.

Washington Wilkes fumbled twice in the contest with senior Nic Sparks pouncing on the loose football after senior Reid Watson stripped the ball loose.


Senior Chase Barnett also finished with a team-high 12 tackles and 6 assists while emerging as one of Union's go-to guys on offense. The power back car-

ried 15 times for 74 yards and a score, while reeling in a 6-yard touchdown reception in the final minutes of the first quarter.

The dynamic duo of senior wide outs Jacob Rogers and Robert Prunier combined for some impressive numbers. Rogers caught three

passes for 106 yards and 2 scores. Prunier finished with 5 grabs for 62 yards.

Gilbert recorded a gamehigh 6 catches for 101 yards. Mancsuo, also a junior,





Following another Wilkes punt, the Tigers proved why they've had the No. 1 defense in 8-AA for three-straight seasons.

Cross Country: Union County men place sixth at State; ladies 10th Defending champ Garrison gives it a go despite injury, finishes 16th

Carrollton - The Union County Cross Country squads returned to the State Championship Meet over the weekend, and despite not picking up another State Championship, both teams still had plenty of reasons to hold its heads high.

The Region 8-AA Champion Union County men hit the course at high noon and finished in 6th place, the best team finish since 2000 when they placed fifth.

"The guys continued to surprise me all season-long at the way they just kept getting better and better," Union County Head Cross Country Coach Jackie Hughes said.

Freshman Lance Underwood led the Panthers with a 20th place finish in 18:29. He was also the second highest freshman finisher at the meet with Jack Douglas of Pace Academy coming in fifth.

Junior Cristian Garcia placed 48th in 19:26, junior Jacob Kelley was 53rd at 19:35, Timothy Murphy came in 55th at 19:39, sophomore Adam Bachman finished 65th in 19:55, senior Aaron Stafford was 81st at 20:24, sophomore Jakob Brown checked in 119th with a time of 21:18.

The Panthers finished the race with 235 points. Placing ahead of 6th place Union was State Champ Wesleyan at 44 points, runner up Pace Academy with 56 points, third place Bleckley County with 90 points, fourth place Lovett with 99 points, and fifth place Holy Innocents at 145 points.

Behind Union was seventh place Darlington with 238, eighth place Vidalia with

273, ninth place Lamar County with 306, and 10th place Berrien at 326 points.

"Our initial goal was top 10," Coach Hughes said. "But as the season progressed we changed our goal to earning one of the podium spots, which is first through fourth. So we came pretty darn close."

As for the Region Champion Lady Panthers, junior Emma Garrison was unable to win her third State Championship and placed 16th.

Junior Anna Danek was 65th at 24:27, junior Stephanie Busse came in 72nd at 24:44, senior Marissa Spaulding was 85th at 25:43, sophomore Cora Bauman placed 105th at 26:37, and junior Raphaela Aleman was 119th at 27:21.

Ahead of 10th place Union, who finished with 272 points was State Champ Lovett with 33 points, runner up Wesleyan had 75 points, third place went to Darlington with 76 points, Holy Innocents was fourth with 117. Pace Academy took home fifth with 160 points, Lamar County was sixth with 187 points, seventh place went to St. Vincents Academy with 220 points, eighth place was Model at 254 points, and ninth place Bleckley County at 269.
