

Lady Panthers use 10 treys to score second straight win vs Towns

Hiawassee - With more than 1,000 high school basketball wins between the two, Union County Head Coach David Tucker and Towns County Head Coach Jim Melton found themselves in another Purple and Blue chess match at Bill P. Kendall Gymnasium on Saturday.

Both teams went into the contest handicapped by injured senior point guards. Union County is still without reigning Region 8-AA Player of the Year Lauren Zollinger, and the Lady Indians have been forced into action without the services of First Team Region 8-A selection Eryn Cochran. But neither squad did the classic rivalry any injustice - leaving it all on the floor in a 49-43 Union County victory.

The Lady Panthers hit 10 threes and improved to 4-0 as they hopped on the back of juniors Brooke Maddox and "Lefty" Kaitlyn Day, to defeat Towns County in consecutive games for the first time in nearly five years.

The junior duo provided 35 of Union's 49 points.


After Union knocked down 11 treys and defeated Towns by six in 2012's Battle of the States Semi-Final, Tucker's offense seems to have found a groove against the Lady Indians' 1-3-1 defense. Although, Tucker admits that his offense has stayed the same, and he's simply been blessed with hot shooters in the last two match-ups.

"My zone offense is the same no matter what: shooters shoot," Coach Tucker said. "We were able to just shoot the ball well (in the two wins).

In the fourth quarter, Day connected on three consecutive treys, opening up a 41-37 Union lead with 3:57 to play. Two came from the corner before the Lady Indians could adjust. With Towns smothering the corner-trey, Day was freed up at the top and stuck a dagger-trey in the back of the

Lady Indians. "Kaitlyn doesn't like to play up top, but against their 1-3-1, shooters shoot," Coach Tucker said. "But when she found out where she wanted to go, I knew we were in good shape.

Maddox would put away the Lady Indians with a lay in off an inbounds pass and three late free throws.

around Union County basketball over the last four years knows what Coach Tucker will do with a late lead, and that's exactly how Lady Panthers held the ball forcing Towns to foul.

"You know how I am, I like to hold the ball," Coach the first half. Tucker said.

Maddox was sent to the line and knocked down two clutch 1-and-1 free throws with 53 seconds to play. Towns made it 47-43 with 32 seconds left but missed a desperation three with 15 seconds left that sealed the deal. Maddox and Day added a free throw each in the final 13 ticks, to fittingly seal the Union County victory.

Towns County, who was the 4th ranked public school in Class A, dropped to 4-2 after being shocked 54-50 at Lakeview Anyone who has been Academy on Friday night.


Maddox led the way with a game-high 18 points and Day was close behind with 17.

But before Maddox and the final minutes played out. The Day could find their groove, senior Madison Rich kept Union in the contest early as Towns tried to finish off the Lady Panthers in

According to Tucker, when Maurer fouled out, Rich was forced to play out of position.

"That meant that Madison had to throw it in, and she's supposed to playing up top with Brooke and Kaitlyn.'

Despite giving up the quick spurt and getting dominated on the offensive boards, the Lady Panthers were able to keep Towns out of its full-court pressure defense, up-and-down style of play. Playing out of rhythm with a young Lady Panthers' team still hanging around, the pressure continued to mount on the Lady Indians.

The fourth quarter began with another stalemate. Until Towns forgot about Day. A devastating miscue.

"I knew if 'Lefty' found it we'd have a chance," Coach Tucker said. "But we had a lot of girls step up and do a good job. Anytime we can a win on the road it's a good thing for us."

After all the blood, sweat, and tears, Rich finished with 9 points on three treys and Nalaschi had five to round out the Lady Panther scoring.

Maddox had 5 steals and "We had some bad breaks Maurer and Nalaschi blocked two shots each.

"Once we play under control and get more playing time, we'll be alright," Tucker said.

When asked how Union will be able to build off this win, Tucker responded with a laugh, "one game at a time," he said.

"Towns County is a great team and a great program," he added. "Once they get their point guard, Cochran back, and we get Lauren back, both of us will be as good as anybody. It's a shame that both of them are out but you still gotta play no matter what happens, and hey, its a great win

After the first three minutes at Towns, Union was able to pull away with a 7-0 run, taking a 13-6 lead after one. Junior Kyle Hamby sank a three at the buzzer to spark the Panthers entering the second quarter.

The Panthers used a 15-5 second quarter to put the Indians into a 28-11 hole at the break.

Nine different Panthers scored in the first two quarters.

Union continued to use a balanced scoring attack in the second half.

Eliyah Ryals, Dylan Coyne, Tyler Odom, Lake Arnick, Hunter Hughes, and Hamby continued to pace Union through the third taking a 47-22 advantage entering the fourth.

The Panthers played keep away for the better part of the final 8 minutes in a low-scoring final frame.

Coyne led the Panthers with 8 points. Hughes and Arnick finished with 7 each.


