Fort Oglethorpe - Senior running back Connor Schuknecht rushed for 236 yards and 3 touchdowns to lead Union County in a 40-33 victory at Lakeview Fort-Oglethorpe (LFO) on Monday, Sept. 30.

"Things got a little nervous in the second half,' Schuknecht said. "But we're playing for each other and I'm glad we came out on top and got the W."

In Union's previous game vs. North Murray, it was the defense that picked up the slack in a 21-0 win - this time, the offense returned the favor in a thriller at LFO.

Originally scheduled for Sept. 27, Hurricane Helene bumped the LFO trip back to Sept. 30, forcing the Panthers into two road games in five days, the latter a $\overline{3}1$ -0 loss at No. 10 Ringgold on Oct. 4.

"We only had two days of practice before this [LFO] game," Schuknecht said. "It took a took a toll on us, but we were resilient enough to come out of here with a big win."

At LFO, Union County freshman quarterback Kamden Kendrick connected on 3 touchdown throws, two to Tyler Parker and another to Maddox Young at the 2:34 mark -- putting the Panthers on top 40-33.

Two first-half touchdowns by Schuknecht moved Union out front 13-0, but an LFO score before halftime made it a 13-7 game at the break.

Schuknecht, who posted the first 100-yard game of his career in the previous outing, said after the game, "[My] goal has been to keep getting better and better at moving the rock as the season goes along.'

"It was fourth and forever, but I wanted the ball," Young said. "They ran a play for me, and we ran it to perfection and it was a great throw by Kamden that allowed me to just go up and get it.

"It's a great feeling. I'm happy for the team and happy we could come out of here with a win and looking forward to what we can do in the future."

Union added a 2-point conversion when Young replaced Kendrick and took the QB keeper up the middle to mount a 40-33 margin. return to the LFO 25-yard line,

> On the ensuing LFO possession, the Warriors advanced to midfield until Kaden Combs' fourth-down sack sent the Union offense back out in the victory formation.

Kendrick finished 17 for 26 with 241 yards and three scores; Parker caught four passes for a career-high 105 yards and a pair of TDs; Chetley Cox caught a career-best eight passes for 63 yards; Young finished with 6 receptions for 62 yards and a score.

As for Schuknecht, his 236 yards rushing are the most by a Panther in at least 35 years. single-game rushing record possibly belongs to Jim six at the half. Williams, who rushed for 308 LFO opened the third by yards during a 42-21 win at moving 59 yards on five plays missed on second. A 5-yard

Last week, Schuknecht opened the Union County scoring at LFO, putting the finishing touches on the Panthers' 7-play, 56-yard opening drive. Later, following an LFO missed field goal and a Union turnover on downs, Schuknecht capped off an 8-play, 48-yard drive when he powered his way up the middle for 11 yards. The score came despite LFO's defense standing up Schuknecht at the 5-yard line, however, the Union offensive line quickly came to his aid and pushed the rugby scrum over the goal line for a 13-0 lead.

'I can't say enough about Connor," Union County head coach Michael Perry said. "He is such a good running back and is one of the most physical players I have ever coached. And when he's able to run the ball like that, it opens up our passing game tremendously."

Freshman Micah Wallace halted the Warriors' ensuing possession with a red zone interception, but the Panthers stalled and punted back to LFO with time winding down in the half. for its first lead at 14-13. But as was the case all night, Union had an answer.

The Panthers went 87 yards on 18 plays, eventually finding paydirt on Kendrick's 34-yard connection to Parker down the home sideline. Later, after the defense forced a Warriors' three-and-out, Schuknecht broke a 59-yard touchdown up the gut, racing untouched to the endzone and stretching Union's margin to 26-14.

But LFO, who turned to its ground game in the second half, fired back with consecutive scores of 24 and 9 yards and regained the lead 27-26.

With under 9 minutes left and his team needing a score, Kendrick orchestrated a quick three-play scoring drive that began with a 12-yard run by Schuknecht and ended with a 57-yard RPO completion to Parker, when the defender bit on the play fake and allowed the junior wide out to take the quick throw and win the foot race to the goal line.

With LFO needing an answer down 32-27 late, the Warriors covered 72 yards on seven plays -- regaining the lead via a 1-yard score with 3:37 remaining.

But on the ensuing kickoff, Rich scooped up the squib kick at the 15 and weaved through traffic before breaking out of traffic near midfield, eventually getting caught from Braden Plott and Micah Wallace

penalty dropped Union into third and 12, followed by a tipped pass that nearly resulted in an interception, bringing up fourth and 12 and Young's lategame heroics.

With Union up 40-33, the Warriors returned the kickoff to their own 37, then picked up five via a fourth-and-2 option pitch.

A snap infraction dropped LFO into first-and-15 before the home team fired three straight incompletions. On fourth down, Combs came off the right edge and recorded the game-clinching sack when the QB attempted to buy some time by stepping up in the pocket, but instead, he found the arms of Union's senior linebacker.

"We were in a five-man front," Combs said regarding his fourth-down sack. "I was on the outside and Gunner (Franklin) and Alan (Godinez) did their job by getting penetration and [the QB] ran right to me.

"I think the energy from the offense carried over to the defense on that last drive. We knew [LFO] would be passing and the secondary did their job."

Combs finished with 9 tackles, 2 TFLs and one timely sack. Sophomore Alan Godinez finished with a team-high 10 tackles to go with one sack and a TFL. Senior Ethan Lester had 9 stops and broke up a pass; sophomore Brandon Lynch had 8 tackles; Daniel McPhee, had 6 tackles each.

Freshman Mikey Davis picked up 3 yards on first down, caught two passes for 11 yards; Rich rushed twice for 3 yards; Young added 5 rushing yards.

No. 10 Ringgold 31, Union County 0

Ringgold - Four days removed from its thrilling win at LFO, the Panthers returned to northwest Georgia and were held scoreless for the second time this season, suffering a 31-0 loss to a 10th-ranked Ringgold squad led by 30+ seniors.

"Ringgold has a very good defense and we just couldn't take advantage of some of the coverages they were playing," Perry said. "They are a good team and we knew they were a good team, but now we just have to go into our bye week and get ready for Coahulla Creek next week.'

Union County coughed up the football four times while being held to a season-low 84 yards of total offense. Kendrick finished 6 for 19 with 34 yards and 2 interceptions; Schuknecht rushed 21 times for 61 yards, but two sacks reduced Union's team rushing total to 50 yards.

Lady Panthers to wrap up regular season Wednesday, in position for postseason berth

Union County split its four outings last week, surviving a trip to Murray County in 10 innings and picking up a non-region win over Gilmer on Senior Night.

Later, Union County dropped a 13-4 contest to North Cobb Christian and fell 9-6 at Lakeview-Fort Oglethorpe to close the week. The Lady Panthers wrap up the regular season with a visit to Coahulla Creek on Tuesday, Oct. 8 and host White County on Oct. 9. Both contests start at 5:30 p.m.

Union County currently sits in the low 20s in the Class AAGHSA Postseason rankings and would qualify for a playoff berth with a top-32 finish.

Lady Panthers 5, Murray County 4 (10 inn) - Union County scored three in the 10th to grab a 5-2 lead then held off Murray's rally to escape Chatsworth with the win.

Sophomore Izzy Anthros threw all 10 innings (136 pitches), striking out 13 while allowing 8 hits, 3 earned runs and a walk. Junior Delaney Moses drove in one and doubled twice at the plate during a 2-for-5 day. Senior Reese Kelley doubled and scored while going 2 for 5; sophomore Jules Dyer finished 2 for 4 with a walk: Anthros went 2 for 4 with a double, walk and a run; senior Lily Helton drove in two and walked during a 1-for-4 day; senior Jordane Mullanack doubled, scored, and drove in 2 while going 1 for 5.

Tied at 2-2 entering the 10th, Union opened the inning with Sloane Dyer, the automatic runner at second base. The senior quickly swiped third ahead of a four-pitch walk to Helton. And with one away, Mullanack ripped a two-run double to right field, followed by a two-out RBI double from Moses.
