

# Lady Panthers finish among the top-six in Class AA

Columbus - The Lady Panthers (15-19) won their opening matchup in Columbus for the first time since 2010, knocking off Region 7-AA Champion Sonoraville 2-1 before suffering consecutive losses to eventual State Champion Morgan County and Pike County to finish 2024 among the final six teams in Class AA.

Lady Panthers 2, Sonoraville 1 - Sloane Dyer's 2-run homer in the first spotted Union an early lead, and sophomore Izzy Anthros tossed a complete game as the Lady Panthers avenged a pair of 10-1 regular season losses to the Phoenix.

Dyer's big fly came on the heels of Jordane Mullanack's two-out single and Anthros went on to limit Sonoraville to five hits over 7 innings of work.

Anthros worked around a 1-out single in the bottom half of the first and the Lady Panthers stranded two runners in the second after Reese Kelley was hit by a pitch and Delaney Moses reached on an error.

Mullanack and Dyer both singled with one away in the third but a strikeout and a pop-up ended the Union threat.

Sonoraville got its lone run in the third when a hit batter came around via a two-out double.

Following a 1-2-3 Union half of the fourth, Sonoraville left a runner in scoring position to keep the score at 2-1. Anthros' base hit led off the fifth, but the Lady Panthers were unable to add to the lead.

The Lady Panthers committed four errors in the loss, as Morgan answered Union's lone run with one in the third and four in the fourth.

Four consecutive Morgan County hits, followed by a walk and an RBI groundout put the Lady Panthers in an early 4-0 hole. Later, a leadoff double in the second and a pair of one-out singles made it 6-0 in the bottom of the second.

Kelley started the Union County third with a base hit,

from Moses and Anthros to load the bases. But freshman Addison Whitener's sacrifice fly was all the offense they could muster on the day.

A Morgan County double, a stolen base and a groundout stretched the margin to 7-1. Then after Union was sat down 1-2-3 in the fourth, Morgan built an 11-1 advantage courtesy of four singles, a hit batter and an error.

Anthros allowed 4 hits and 4 earned runs over 1/3of an inning. Kelley worked 2 2/3, giving up 4 hits and followed by one-out singles 3 earned; sophomore Ayla

Jamison worked an inning, surrendering 3 hits and 4 unearned runs.

Anthros finished 1 for 2 at the dish; Whitener went 0 for 1 and accounted for her team's only RBI; Kelley's day ended 1 for 2; Moses went 1 for 1.

Lady Panthers 0, Pike County 4 - Union County's season ended with a 4-0 loss to Pike County on Friday, Nov. 1 despite each team finishing even in the hit column at seven apiece

Pike County did all of its damage in the fourth and the fifth innings, scoring two runs in each frame.

Union fell behind 2-0 in the fourth via a catcher's interference and three straight singles. Pike's lead grew to 4-0 in the fifth behind a leadoff double and a 2-run homer.

The Lady Panthers had their chances but couldn't capitalize - starting with Anthros' leadoff double in the bottom of the first. Senior Lily Helton walked to start the second and advanced into scoring position on Jules Dyer's sacrifice bunt.

Anthros and Whitener recorded back-to-back singles with one away in the third. and Jules Dyer's one-out hit went by the wayside during the fourth.

Helton kept the sixth inning alive with a two-out single, and Kelley and Anthros each singled in the seventh.

Anthros went the distance for Union County, allowing 7 hits, 4 walks and 3 earned runs. She finished 3 for 4 with a double at the plate.

Whitener went 1 for 4; Helton was 1 for 2 with a walk; Jules Dyer went 1 for 2; Kelley finished 1 for 3.

Jefferson - Junior Lola Hunter torched the field on a chilly Saturday morning at Jackson County's Lamar Murphy Park, taking home first by more than 85 seconds at the Class AA State Sectionals on Nov. 2.

Hunter's time of 19 minutes, 45 seconds paced the Union County ladies (99 points) to a third-place overall finish behind host East Jackson (91) and Coahulla Creek (93). Franklin County (104) and Booker T. Washington (119) rounded out the top five.

The Union County men finished fifth, securing a spot for both UCHS teams at Saturday's State Championships in Carrollton.

Sophomore Oliver Hillman came in ninth with a time of 17:42; Noah James Payne was 31st at 19:05; Bryson Brooks placed 32nd at 19:09; Ander Faulkner crossed the line 36th with a time of 19:16: Andrew Nushtayev was 42nd at 19:33.

Other Union County runners included freshman Cole Brown in 55th with a time of 20:05 and Trey Hawley in 56th at 20:13

The Panthers finished behind fourth-place Franklin County (142), third-place Rockmart (106), second-place KIPP Atlanta (89) and first-place East Rockmart.

## Football: NCC offense too much for Union County on Senior Night

Panthers await postseason opponent ahead of next week's Class AA first round

The Panthers (4-6, 4-4) had no answer for sophomore quarterback Teddy Jarrard and the North Cobb Christian offense in a 44-24 Senior Night loss on Thursday, Oct. 31.

Now, Union County awaits its first-round playoff destination, which will be determined Saturday when the brackets are finalized.

The Panthers, who are currently 28th, expect to qualify as one of the top 32 teams in Class AA. However, with a handful of makeup games being played across the state on Friday, Union head coach Michael Perry will have to wait a week to see how the final standings shake out.

"Who knows? I've seen scenarios that have us playing Hapeville, Appling County or Sumter County," he said. "There are a few games this week and how much that will change the rankings at this point, I really don't know. So we have nothing to go on during practice this week. As for last week's loss, Jarrard, a 4-star QB, connected on three of his five TD passes in the first quarter, putting the Panthers in an early 20-3 hole. "He's the best quarterback we've faced since Gunnar Stockton (Rabun County)," Perry said. "And [Jarrard is] just a sophomore and will only

Schuknecht added a fourth-quarter TD for a 37-24 deficit, but Jarrard answered with an 80-yard scoring strike in the final minutes to put the game out of reach.

Two early touchdown passes by Jarrard had the home team in a 13-0 hole before sophomore kicker Grant Smith connected on a 39-yard field goal from the right hash, putting Union on the board.

'Grant and our kicking team have vastly improved over the course of the year," Perry said. "At the beginning of the season, I would have never attempted a field goal, even if my life depended on it. But Grant has worked hard and I'm glad I have two more years with him."

Down 20-3 later in the half, the Panthers sliced the margin in half when freshman Kamden Kendrick put the finishing touches on a 90-yard scoring drive by calling his own number from the 1-yard line.

The Eagles responded with a 31-yard touchdown run, followed by a 34-yard field goal, resulting in a 30-10 lead with less than 3 minutes remaining in the second quarter.

The third quarter opened with a methodical 84-yard Union scoring drive, resulting in a 2-yard touchdown run by Schuknecht, but North Cobb's ensuing drive covered 55 yards and increased its lead to 37-17 with under 3 minutes to play in

the quarter.

Both squads traded punts before Union took over with less than 9 minutes remaining and drove 65 yards, narrowing the margin to 37-24 when Schuknecht found paydirt from 5 yards out.

As the clock ticked under 3 minutes, the Panthers' defense forced North Cobb Christian into a third-andmedium situation, but Jarrard worked his magic one last time, hitting a streaking receiver across the middle for 80 yards and a 44-24 final.

Sophomore Chetley Cox led the way with 6 catches for 48 years, leading a shorthanded receiver group playing without inured junior Tyler Parker.

"I'm really proud of Chetley," Perry said. "He had some big time catches for us off some RPOs and on crossing routes.'

Maddox Young had four grabs for 36 yards, he also rushed three times for 18 yards. Schuknecht caught four passes for 25 yards; freshman Jax Dillinger had two receptions for 27 yards; freshman Mikey Davis hauled in two passes for 13 yards; junior Dominick Tarbert had a 13-yard grab and senior Andrew Engle added an 8-yard reception.

Kendrick finished the game 20 for 29 with 170 yards through the air to go with one rushing score.

Sophomore Bentley Rich had one carry before leaving the game with a foot injury.

Defensively, Union suffered a devastating loss when senior LB Ethan Lester suffered a likely season-ending shoulder injury early in the contest.

No defensive stats were available for last week's game.
